- Teaches annotation for deeper comprehension.
- Allows for synthesis of information through graphic organizers/content mapping.
- Teaches students how to respond after interpretation of raw data and experiences.
- Enhances content learning through written reflections, critical writing, and reading response.
- Fosters crafting of written arguments to deepen understanding of issues.
- Encourages writing like a 'scientist' after experiments
